Goals for the course.

- Develop a basic understanding of human cognitive processes, both in general and in terms of oneself
- Understand the research base that produces scientific knowledge of human cognitive processes
- Be able to relate cognitive psychology phenomena to problems in many fields (including design, engineering, biology, education, etc.) as well as in daily life
- Develop experience in interpreting and communicating scientific findings in cognitive psychology

Notes on the readings. Students are to come to class having read the required chapter. Power point notes will be made available on the course website. Class lectures will cover important

concepts, both within and in addition to, the text. Exams will contain items from the text as well as from in class.

Final paper. For the final paper, you will need to choose a recent paper (published 2006-2011) from Cognitive Science, Cognitive Development, Cognition and Instruction, or Cognitive Psychology, pertaining to cognitive psychology. You will need to send me the paper (or a link to it) for approval. You can complete this assignment individually or in groups of up to three. You will read this article, and will A) summarize the findings of the article, and B) write a description of how the article's findings should influence practice in another field of your choice (you will need to detail the field in advance). More detail will be given in class.

Exams. There are two exams, the material covered is <u>not</u> cumulative across the two tests. The format for the exams is: High-level questions that test both your factual knowledge and your ability to apply that knowledge to reason about and suggest plausible solutions to real-world problems

Quizzes. Four quizzes will be given during the term. These quizzes will be given at the beginning of a class. The format for the quizzes is: concept/name matching; short-answer, and multiple choice. Quizzes will be based solely on that day's readings. Quizzes will not be announced in advance. Credit for a missed quiz is not possible; however, if class is missed for a suitable reason, that quiz will be removed from the final grade calculation. (e.g. no penalty). The lowest quiz grade for any specific student will be dropped.

Missed classes/Late assignments. Rescheduling exams and late assignments require a suitable reason (e.g. illness, death in the family, or other reason confirmed by a WPI Dean). A doctor's note will be required for missed exams or late assignments due to illness. All assignments are due at the **beginning** of class – any assignment turned in after it is requested in class will receive a 20% penalty. Any assignment turned in more than one class session late (without a suitable reason) will receive a grade of 0.

Note on the lectures: Lectures in this class will be used to supplement, not duplicate the assigned reading. Since the text gives the necessary background information in great

detail, we will use class time primarily to reinforce the most basic and important points and explain their significance, to conduct or to discuss demonstrations of cognitive phenomena and other active learning exercises, and to explore areas not fully covered by the text.
